DEPARTMENT OF ART AND ARCHAEOLOGY

THE ART AND ARCHAEOLOGY DEPARTMENT FACULTY AWARD is presented to an outstanding senior art major. The art department faculty has presented this award for more than 20 years. This year's recipient is Robert Penny.

Robert is an archaeology student and Air National Guard veteran from Ohio. His archaeological interests range from ancient Turkey to the U.S. Midwest but center especially on the intersection of religion and belief systems with the use of built and unbuilt space. As vice president of the Archaeology Club, Robert has led restoration work and study of the historic African American cemetery at Halfway, near Hagerstown, Maryland, and he is now a member of the board that oversees and supports work there. His plans for the future include graduate studies in archaeology, with a focus on remote sensing techniques.

THE MARY ELLEN RANDOLPH PRIZE, named in memory of Associate Professor Emerita Mary Ellen Randolph, is awarded to an art major who demonstrates equal proficiency in and enthusiasm for art history and the studio arts. Randolph retired in 1989 after 29 years of service to the College. She continued to participate in the life of the Hood community until her death in October 2005. Because she taught both studio art and art history, the award recognizes students who have demonstrated talent in both fields. Anna Martin is this year's prize-winner.

Anna is a double major in art history and studio art, with a particular interest in classical and renaissance art, including its conservation and display. Her studio work involves painting, collage, wire sculpture and mixed media, using natural materials, trash and paint. Her senior exhibition is entitled "ex-human."

THE ANNA LOUISE REMSEN PRIZE IN ART is awarded to a member of the junior or senior class who maintains a high standard of work in fine and applied art. This prize was established in 1948 as a memorial to Anna Louise Remsen, Class of 1933, and was endowed by Remsen's sister, Edwin Richardson; her stepmother, Elizabeth Remsen; and her friend, Hildegarde Liebich. The prize-winner is Max Peterson.

Max is a double major in psychology and studio art. She works in a wide range of art media, with a special focus for her senior exhibition on painting. In addition to her studies, Max is an active member in Hood's choir, theatre and literary magazine. Her senior exhibition is entitled "Recollection."

THE ART AND ARCHAEOLOGY DEPARTMENT ALUMNAE AWARD is presented to an outstanding junior or senior art major, recognizing interest in the scholarship of art. The award recipients are Emma Flanagan and Ashley Visscher.

Emma is an art history major focusing on the art of early modern Europe. In summer 2023, she completed an archival research internship at Fulham Palace in London. Her departmental honors thesis is entitled "Domestic Domains: Understanding the Dutch Family and Home in the 17th Century." Emma's lifelong love of music inspired her to pursue a minor in music history in order to expand her knowledge of the history of the arts.

Ashley is an art history major, with minors in studio art and history. She completed an internship at the College this spring. Ashley's responsibilities included assisting with exhibitions and general gallery management tasks as well as organizing and cataloguing the College's art collection. Her work will culminate in an exhibition of local artist Estelle Schutz here at Hood this summer.

THE SUZANNE GOTTERT '68 PRIZE IN ART was established in 2001 by Suzanne Gottert '68 and is presented each year to an outstanding junior art major who is minoring or concentrating in studio art, specifically two-dimensional art (e.g., printmaking, drawing or painting). This year's prize-winner is Melanie Perry.

Melanie is a junior studio art major who works in a range of materials, including paint and sculpture. An Army veteran, Melanie's sculptures have been featured in several Combat Paper Exhibitions, and a painting of hers has been on display at the Capital One Tower in McLean, Virginia. With an interest in helping others, Melanie hopes to start a nonprofit after graduation that would provide art materials for children from low-income households.

THE ELAINE ADRIENNE GATES MEMORIAL PRIZE IN STUDIO ART was established in 2011 in memory of Elaine Adrienne Gates, associate professor emerita of art, who taught at Hood from 1960 to 1997; she died in 2004. Gates was an ethereal free spirit, an artist with a renaissance soul and a philosopher/teacher who mentored, nurtured and encouraged her students with just the right mix of dedication and discipline. The prize is awarded to the student who exhibits a similar sense of dedication, determination and intensive exploration in the studio arts resulting in significant growth, development and artistic accomplishment. Ashlynn Stearns is the recipient of this prize.

Ashlynn is a senior who is double majoring in studio art and art history, with a minor in film studies. Ashlynn spent a semester in Italy, where she created a body of photographic work. Her departmental honors project, which merges her majors and minor, includes a film on Cindy Sherman's "Untitled Film Stills." Ashlynn's senior exhibition is titled "Adolescent Echoes!"

THE TAUREAN WASHINGTON '12 INVESTMENT IN ARTISTIC EXCELLENCE AWARD was established in 2024 by Taurean Washington '12. The award is given annually to a senior art major with a declared studio arts concentration who is a member of the BIPOC community and has demonstrated excellent skills and growth in the visual arts. Khaliah Deya is this year's recipient.

Khaliah is a multidisciplinary artist and senior studio art major. Her work in graphite, pen and colored pencil explores themes of self-perception, music and community. A native of Baltimore, Khaliah's artworks have appeared in two books published through the local literary arts organization CHARM: Voices of Baltimore. She also completed an internship at the Frederick Arts Council. Khaliah's senior exhibition "Was any of it even real?" incorporates elements of sculpture, printmaking, photography and collage.

DEPARTMENT OF BIOLOGY

THE BETA BETA AWARD is presented to a high-ranking student in Biology 100 to 200-level courses upon the recommendation of the biology department. Kendall Elenbaas, Eliza Goldsberry, Isaac Hatch, Kelly Kinney and Faith Meadows share the award.

In her first year at Hood, Kendall has shown herself to be an engaged, curious and highly accomplished student at the 100 and 200 levels. Her promising future as a biologist is evidenced by her selection as a summer intern with the protein expression laboratory at NCI Frederick.

Eliza is a sophomore majoring in environmental science and policy. She is being recognized for excellent work in the biology 200-level courses.

Isaac has actively been involved in both 100-level biology lectures and labs. He has qualified to be an outstanding student and a role model for other students in our classrooms.

Kelly did an excellent job and maintained a perfect record in her biology course. She enjoyed acquiring new knowledge and helping other students who need additional assistance in the lab section.

Faith is an excellent student in the biology and honors programs. She is planning on becoming a physician's assistant after graduation and enjoys relaxing by playing games with friends.

THE JANE D. MCCARRELL PRIZE is awarded to a junior or senior who has shown excellence, interest and progress in the field of biology. This award, endowed by former students, alumnae and friends, honors the late Jane D. McCarrell, professor of biology and chair of Hood's biology department from 1946 to 1972. The prize is awarded to Riana Caldwell.

Riana is a biology major and member of the honors program. She has demonstrated consistent excellence in her coursework across all areas of study. She is a member of the BlazerBloom AlgaePrize research team and will be doing research this summer at the National Cancer Institute.

THE SIDNEY SILVERMAN AWARD, named in honor of the late Associate Professor Emeritus Sidney Silverman, is awarded to an outstanding student majoring in biology. Silverman taught at Hood from 1974 to 1985 and did research at Fort Detrick and NIH. His colleagues in the department established this award in his honor. The prize is awarded to Madeline Schwab and Christina Shaner.

Madeline is a graduating senior who is completing her departmental honors research on the microbiological and biochemical characterization of cellulolytic bacteria. She is looking forward to working in a research lab after graduation.

Christina is a graduating senior in the environmental science and policy program, with a keen interest in environmental protection and monitoring. She was a National Science Foundation-Research Experience for Undergraduates intern in Maine, where she conducted experiments on the physiology of lobster larvae, had adventures on the high seas and moved 20 tons of rock by hand, all in the name of science. She is currently analyzing a data set from her internship on the effects of temperature on lobster larva settlement to present at the Annual Benthic Ecology Meeting in Charleston, South Carolina.

THE BIOLOGY FACULTY AWARD was created in 2001 to honor a student or students demonstrating great promise in biology. The biology department faculty provide this book prize. The prize is awarded to Katie Amaguana, Isabella DiPietrantonio, Alexa Gieseman, Kate Maltby, Eisella Pearson, Josephine Sasse and Kate Stultz.

Katie is a senior biology major, with a chemistry minor. As an honors student, she is enthusiastic, quick to understand concepts, hardworking and independent in carrying out research. She did an excellent job on her capstone project, studying the effect of sugar on Drosophila. Currently, she is helping to develop a protocol for measurement of lactase enzyme activity with the biology faculty and doing an internship at a biotech company. In addition, Katie has been a student-athlete, playing on the women's volleyball team. She plans to pursue graduate school in the future.

Isabella is a junior sustainability studies major. She has outstanding academic performance and wide interests in sustainability, and she is passionate about research and sustainability actions. Isabella will be participating in the Summer Research Institute in 2024.

It is clear from her academic accomplishments in lecture and lab that Alexa is an ambitious student who sets high goals for herself. The faculty look forward to seeing her progress with excellence in courses beyond the 200 level as she continues to shape her academic journey, including her interest in veterinary medicine.

Kate M. is a senior sustainability studies major and a Tischer Scholar. She has a strong academic record and passion for sustainability. She is an excellent researcher and has accomplished an independent study in the past year using black soldier flies in reducing animal manure.

Eisella is a sophomore biology major in the honors program. She has an exceptional academic record and is interested in post-graduate clinical work, with a particular interest in dermatology.

Josephine is a junior sustainability studies major. She has great passion for sustainability, especially sustainable agriculture. She is outstanding in linking her experience in agriculture with what she has learned in class. She also demonstrated a strong commitment in promoting sustainability on campus and beyond. Josephine will be participating in the Summer Research Institute in 2024.

Kate S. has demonstrated a high level of success in 200-level biology courses. She will be doing an internship this summer at NCI, studying ribosome and stress response.

THE ROUSE GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP is awarded annually to an outstanding senior biology major who has displayed excellence in scholarship, citizenship and sincerity of purpose and who is planning to pursue graduate study in biology, medicine or an allied scientific field. George Parke Rouse Jr., M.D., established this scholarship to honor his wife, the late Elizabeth L. Chandler Rouse, Class of 1936, and his daughter, Anne Rouse McDowell, Ph.D., Class of 1969. Kayla Russell is this year's recipient.

Kayla is an outstanding student and a hard worker. She has excelled as a biology major and has been admitted to the biomedical science master's program, where she will begin classes this summer. She works in an area laboratory and is well on her way to becoming an excellent researcher.

THE DR. RUTH ESTHER GRIFFITH BIOLOGY AWARD is awarded annually to a junior who has demonstrated excellence in critical thinking and communication skills in the field of biology and who is planning to participate in faculty-mentored research within the biology department. This year's recipient is Khatija Nishat.

Khatija excels in biology courses. She has an exemplary record of academic achievement. She will be working with a biology faculty in the fall to complete her capstone requirement.

THE NORM GARY BIOLOGY AWARD was established in 2016 to honor the late Norman D. Gary, chair of the Department of Biology, teacher of microbiology and professor emeritus to a generation of Hood College students. This book prize is awarded to a top student based on performance in their biology elective courses. This year's recipients are Ian Emanuel, Riley Fitz and Austin Kaplan.

Ian is a 4PLUS student working on his bachelor's in environmental science and policy and his master's in environmental biology. In collaboration with scientists at the Smithsonian Institution, Ian has done research on pitcher plants. Currently, his Tischer Scholar research examines nontarget effects of Bti spraying programs. Ian is an outstanding student of natural history, and most days he can be found in the field studying his current favorite topics: plants, insects and geology.

Riley is an environmental science and policy major and a 4PLUS student completing her master's in environmental biology. She serves as president of the Student Government Association, secretary of the senior class and chemistry tutor in the Student Success Center. In the past, Riley has researched the thermal tolerance of lobster larvae, freshwater fisheries and aquatic invasive species. Currently, her Tischer Scholar research investigates the effect of allelochemicals on non-native stilt grass.

Austin, a biology major who is minoring in coastal studies, has distinguished himself in elective biology and marine science classes. His interest and deep curiosity in all aspects of aquatic ecology, particularly fishery science, bode well for his future in the profession.

THE HANS WAGNER MEMORIAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD was established in 2022 by the family of the late Hans Wagner, former lab supervisor for the biology department, who served the College with enthusiasm and dedication for nearly 20 years. The award is given annually to two seniors with the highest GPAs who will be graduating with a biology degree. Ridley Little and Katie Stang share this award.

Ridley has distinguished herself in her coursework, earning a nearly perfect GPA. She is a member of the BlazerBloom AlgaePrize research team and is on the Hood women's swimming team among her many activities.

Katie is a very serious student and a hard worker who consistently strives for excellence in her studies and all that she does. She shows great promise as an up-and-coming researcher in biology and will complete departmental honors with biology faculty.

THE JEANNE MARIE JACOBSEN MEDALIS '89 MEMORIAL AWARD was established in 2022 by Tim Jacobsen in memory of his wife, Jeanne M. Jacobsen Medalis '89. The award is given annually to a rising sophomore or junior majoring in biology who is also minoring in studio art or is involved in the arts in some way at Hood College. This year's recipient is Rebecca Carroll.

Rebecca is a junior majoring in biology and minoring in drama and theatre. At Hood, she played Nick Bottom in "A Midsummer Night's Dream" and the maid Helsa Wenzel in "Musical Comedy Murders of 1940."

DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY AND PHYSICS

THE AMERICAN INSTITUTE OF CHEMISTS FOUNDATION is presented to a student or students majoring in biochemistry or chemistry for outstanding scholastic achievement and ability. The recipient of this award is Atef Shat.

Atef is a senior from Frederick, Maryland. He is majoring in chemistry, with a minor in mathematics, and is a member of the honors program. Atef serves as the organic chemistry tutor at the Student Success Center, and his dedication is well appreciated by students.

THE MARYLAND SECTION OF THE AMERICAN CHEMICAL SOCIETY presents an award to an outstanding upper-level student in chemistry at each of the participating colleges in the state. The prizes were awarded at a banquet and ceremony in Towson, Maryland. This year's recipient is Anthony Rispoli.

Anthony is a senior from Ijamsville, Maryland. He is double majoring in chemistry and computer science. Anthony conducted research with Professor Ashish Chakradhar, Ph.D., as part of the 2022 Summer Research Institute on a project titled "Reactivity Study of High-Capacity Mesoporous Perovskite Oxides Catalyst towards Thiophene Hydrodesulfurization." He presented the results at a National American Chemical Society meeting. Anthony is currently conducting a departmental honors project on using molecular dynamics simulations to dock potential ligands to Sars-Cov-2 proteins. After completing his undergraduate degree, he plans to attend graduate school.

THE ELIZABETH B. BOWER PRIZE, honoring the late Elizabeth B. Bower, is awarded annually to an outstanding student in chemistry. The prize was established in 1956 by the late Rebecca Ann Eversole Parker '55, who was inspired by Professor Bower to make chemistry her career. At the time of her death, Rebecca was studying for her doctorate in chemistry at Oxford University. In 1962, the Eversole family endowed the prize as a memorial to Rebecca. Nick Titus is this year's recipient.

Nick is a junior from Mount Airy, Maryland. He is majoring in chemistry and currently working on a research project with alumna and trustee, Susan Audino '85, B.A.'99, Ph.D.

THE VESTA HOFFMAN OSLER '30 CHEMISTRY AWARD was established in 2011 by Vesta Osler Mershon and Estelle Osler Hess in memory of their mother, Vesta Hoffman Osler '30. The award is presented to the highest-ranking junior chemistry major. Melissa Nunez is this year's recipient.

Melissa is a junior from Germantown, Maryland. She is majoring in chemistry and minoring in mathematics. She will be conducting research with Professor Ashish Chakradhar, Ph.D., as part of the 2024 Summer Research Institute on a project titled "High-Capacity Mesoporous Perovskite Oxide Catalysts for Hydrodesulfurization."

THE CHEMISTRY ACHIEVEMENT AWARD is presented by the CRC Press, Inc., to the highest-ranking first-year student in Chemistry 101 or 102 during the current academic year. The award goes to Amanda Ambrose.

Amanda is a first-year student from Frederick, Maryland. She is an environmental science major and hopes to pursue a career in the National Park Service one day.

THE GEORGE G. KLEINSPEHN HONOR SCHOLARSHIP is named in honor of Whitaker Professor Emeritus George G. Kleinspehn and is awarded to a student whose record in two semesters of organic chemistry at Hood College is outstanding. Professor Kleinspehn taught at Hood from 1967 to 1993. Prior to Hood, Kleinspehn had research experience on the Manhattan Project in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, at Johns Hopkins University and at the U.S. Army Ballistics Research Laboratories in Aberdeen, Maryland. Colin Flanagan, Alexa Gieseman and Alisa Gorham are this year's recipients.

Colin is a double major in chemistry and mathematics from Towson, Maryland. This summer, he will be participating in a prestigious National Science Foundation-funded chemical research program at the University of Southern Mississippi.

Alexa is a sophomore from Damascus, Maryland, majoring in biology and minoring in chemistry. She intends to pursue veterinary medicine upon graduation.

Alisa is a sophomore from Monrovia, Maryland. Alisa is a biochemistry major and a member of the honors program. She is interested in pharmaceutical science and plans to attend graduate school after Hood.

THE ELIZABETH LEIBY WOOD PRIZE is awarded to a member of the rising senior class who is an overall outstanding student and has accomplished superior work in chemistry or biochemistry. The prize was established in 1944 by Scott S. Leiby in honor of his daughter Elizabeth, Class of 1938. The prize is awarded to Luke Walker.

Luke is a junior from Jefferson, Maryland, majoring in biochemistry with a minor in mathematics. He is a current member of the Blazers baseball team. Luke plans to attend pharmacy school after he graduates from Hood.

DEPARTMENT OF COMPUTER SCIENCE AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

THE RAYMOND L. AND LOUISE K. GILLARD PRIZE is endowed by Gary Gillard, assistant professor of information technology, in memory of his parents. The prize is awarded annually to a student(s) based on merit. The prize is awarded to Benjamin Davids.

Benjamin is a computer science major, with a minor in mathematics, from Hagerstown, Maryland. He is also a member of the honors program. From 2019-21, Benjamin co-led an English-Spanish conversation group, and he is also very involved with his church. Benjamin is interested in predictive data analytics and particularly its intersection with law and politics. In his free time, he likes to read novels, play the guitar and learn languages. After graduation, his dream is to work in the legal or political system using the data-driven skills he learned at Hood and to possibly pursue a Juris Doctor.

THE COMPUTER SCIENCE UNDERGRADUATE ACHIEVEMENT AWARD is given to a senior student who has demonstrated continued excellence in computer science studies. Carrie Wasieloski is this year's winner.

Carrie is a senior computer science major in the honors program. She has completed two internships: first, at Genesis Engineering Solutions, where she worked on the sensor system for the next generation of spacesuits for the new space station, and then at Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, where she worked on computer algorithms for predicting patient readmission and generating sub-phenotypes for diagnosis. For future work, she is interested in data analytics and artificial intelligence.

THE COMPUTER SCIENCE FACULTY PRIZE is awarded to a student selected by the department faculty to recognize excellence. The recipient is Sophia Ferrer.

Sophia is a junior majoring in computer science, with a minor in mathematics. She completed the Honors College and STEM Scholars programs at Frederick Community College and has also been awarded the Founder's Scholarship at Hood for three semesters. Last summer, Sophia conducted research on predicting the mortality of type 2 diabetes patients utilizing large language models. This summer, she will continue her medical research on obstructive sleep apnea patients at the Lawrence Berkeley National Lab. Sophia demonstrates remarkable dedication to her academic goals and strives for excellence.

THE COMPUTER SCIENCE CHAIR'S PRIZE is awarded to a student in the introductory course sequence who shows great potential in computer science. The prize is awarded to Itunuoluwa Ayo-Durojaiye.

Itunuoluwa is a computer science major from Damascus, Maryland. She earned her high school diploma from Clarksburg High School and A.A.S. from Montgomery College in 2023, and she will be graduating from Hood in 2026. Itunuoluwa earned several IT professional certificates, such as CompTIA A+ and CompTIA Network+. She is currently a student worker for the Hood College IT Helpdesk. She is interested in building a career in software engineering or cybersecurity.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

THE MAUREEN KELLY HESS PRIZE is awarded annually to a student who is graduating with a bachelor's in special education or a master's with a concentration in special education. The education department faculty select the prize recipient. This prize was established by the Hess and Kelly families in memory of Maureen Kelly Hess, Class of 1981, after her death in April 1993. THE PARK-DORFF AWARD is presented to that student in the senior class who appears most promising as a teacher in the field of early childhood education. Classmates Sara Bell Parkhurst Van Why and Katherine Nixdorff Wilson, both Class of 1973 early childhood education majors, established this prize in 1974 to honor an outstanding student majoring in this field. No other prize existed at this time for ECE majors. Remy Anderson and Skye Haghverdi are this year's recipients.

Remy is an early childhood education major who shows great promise as a future teacher. Remy did well in her internship placements, both at Georgetown Hill Lab School and in Frederick County Public Schools. Remy actively participated in classes and shared both her knowledge and experiences with her peers. She is deeply committed to supporting the growth and development of young children. She is passionate about early childhood education and will be a wonderful pre-K-grade 3 teacher.

Skye is an early childhood education major who demonstrates a strong commitment to promoting the positive development of young children. She did well academically and was enthusiastic in her internships at Georgetown Hill Lab School and Frederick County Public Schools. Skye brings a unique perspective and expertise concerning the importance of supporting the growth and development of all children. She is a wonderful student and will be an excellent pre-K-grade 3 teacher.

THE HYPATIA MATHEMATICS/SCIENCE EDUCATION PRIZE is awarded to the education student who exemplifies excellence in the field of mathematics or science teaching. This prize, named for the female Greek mathematician who taught at the Library of Alexandria in the early fifth century, is awarded in honor of past Department of Education professors of mathematics and science pedagogy at Hood College. This year's recipient is Madi Brown.

Madi is a model elementary/special education major. In addition to being an excellent student, she consistently exhibits intellectual curiosity by asking thought-provoking questions and going above and beyond to learn more. This passion for learning will ensure she is going to be an excellent teacher.

THE CHARLES E. TRESSLER OUTSTANDING STUDENT AWARD is given in recognition of outstanding achievement by a student who intends to enter a career in education. This award was established to honor the late Giles Professor Emeritus of Early Childhood Education Charles E. Tressler. Professor Tressler taught at Hood from 1964 to 1990 and served for many years as chair of the Department of Education. The award is a gift from the estate of Samuel Eig. This year's recipients are Logan Bruner and Emily Webb.

Logan is an exemplary candidate in the English secondary education program, where he has achieved great success in his teaching internships and courses. In addition to his academic talent, he is highly reflective and insightful in his approach to planning lessons and supporting students. Logan will be an outstanding English teacher who inspires students by sharing the joys of literature and learning throughout his career.

Emily is an English secondary education candidate who has demonstrated excellence in both her academic endeavors and teaching internships. She approaches her work with curiosity and reflection, sharing valuable contributions and encouragements with those around her. Emily's winsome personality, academic talents and care for students will make her a wonderful teacher.

THE JOHANNA CHAIT ESSEX '53 PRIZE IN EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION was established by the family of Johanna Chait Essex '53 in honor of her 80th birthday. Essex devoted her professional life to educating nursery school children. THE ESTHER E. SHAW AWARD is given for the best news story appearing in The Blue and Grey in the past academic year. Janiel Suren is this year's recipient.

THE ALYCE WEINBERG HONOR SCHOLARSHIP, named in honor of the late Alyce Weinberg, is awarded to a senior majoring in English or communication arts who has done meritorious work in English, particularly in communications. Weinberg established this scholarship because she firmly believed in the value of education. She took numerous courses at Hood as an adult learner, but she did not enroll as a degree-seeking student. Weinberg could be considered the ultimate continuing education student, a genuine lifelong learner. THE JANICE E. THE MARGARET P. FORD HONOR SCHOLARSHIP was established in honor of the late Professor Emerita Margaret P. Ford, who taught English at Hood from 1964 to 1987 and served as chair of the department for many years. She taught numerous courses in American literature and was a student of the life and writings of William Faulkner. This scholarship was established by Hood's Board of Trustees to honor Professor Ford. The prize is awarded annually at the discretion of the English department faculty. Kayla Swain is this year's recipient.

Kayla, from Walkersville, Maryland, is a graduating senior English major, with a concentration in creative writing and a minor in drama and theatre. She is completing her departmental honors paper this semester.

DEPARTMENT OF GLOBAL LANGUAGES AND CULTURES

THE GERMAN EMBASSY PRIZE OF THE WASHINGTON EMBASSY OF THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF GERMANY is awarded in recognition of outstanding achievement in German language and literature. The prize goes to Cole Tate.

Cole is a Spanish major who also has a passion for learning other languages, including Arabic, Catalan and German. He is a role model student in his intermediate German courses. Cole will be studying abroad in Barcelona in fall 2024.

THE EDENIA GUILLERMO AWARD is awarded to a senior Hispanic student who has achieved the highest academic record in four years of study. This prize was established in 1983 to honor Edenia Guillermo, professor emerita of Spanish, who taught at Hood from 1975 to 1983; she died in 2002. Axel Barahona Perez is this year's winner.

Axel is a double major in Spanish and global studies. He has been the Spanish tutor at Hood for the last three years, doing a wonderful job teaching our novice and intermediate students how to better navigate Spanish. Axel has also been a student worker at the Department of Global Languages and Cultures. He has participated in the National Model United Nations, winning an award for Outstanding Delegation. Following his interest in Latin American sociopolitical issues, Axel has completed a departmental honors paper that focuses on the concept of race and discrimination in the Latin American society. After graduation, Axel will travel to Europe to visit Italy and Spain and will pursue a master's to continue his studies in international relations, with a focus on Latin America.

THE E. LOUISE LEONARD PRIZE is awarded annually to a senior whose major subject is French and who has done excellent work in the language and literature of France. Associate Professor Emerita E. Louise Leonard taught French and Italian at Hood from 1926 to 1970. The prize was established and endowed in 1969 by former students of Professor Leonard for whom she was an exemplar and inspiration. Noah Hersh is this year's recipient.

Noah is a graduating senior majoring in French and political science. He is completing a departmental honors thesis on politics of the former sub-Saharan African colonies within the official discourse of the Fifth Republic. Noah studied abroad in Toulouse, France, last year and plans to attend graduate school at American University.

THE JACK AND JANET SPAULDING NUNN '61 FRENCH PRIZE is awarded to the most outstanding student studying abroad in France and to academically outstanding first-year students who intend to be French majors. Janet Nunn, a Hood alumna and long-time Francophile, funded this prize to support the study of French language and culture at Hood. Gracyn Van Bemmel is this year's recipient.

Gracyn is a sophomore majoring in communication arts, with an advanced proficiency certificate in French. She is also a Chair of the Board Scholar and a member of the honors program. Gracyn plans to study abroad in France next spring.

THE CHARLOTTE A. MORAN PRIZE is awarded to a student of the French language who shows outstanding achievement in intermediate French and plans to pursue additional studies in French. This prize honors the memory of Charlotte A. Moran, associate professor emerita of French and 1957 Hood alumna. Professor Moran taught at Hood from 1966 to 1989; she died in 2000. The prize is shared by Mimi Bafor, Robin Draetta, Elisha Kabongo and Rachel Miller.

Mimi is a sophomore majoring in studio art and mathematics. She excels in intermediate French and plans to continue her study of the language.

Robin is a sophomore majoring in studio art. He excels in intermediate French and hopes to continue studying the language. He is also a member of the honors program.

Elisha is a first-year student in the honors program. She excels in intermediate French and plans to continue her study of the language.

Rachel is a first-year student from York, Pennsylvania, who intends to major in social work. She excels in intermediate French and serves as a Blazer Ambassador. Rachel is also a Chair of the Board Scholar and a member of the honors program.

THE JACK AND JANET SPAULDING NUNN '61 AWARD FOR BEST ELEMENTARY ARABIC STUDENT was established in 2008 and supported by Janet Spaulding Nunn '61. The award is presented to a student who has excelled in elementary Arabic and plans to pursue additional studies in Arabic. Ahmad Parker is this year's recipient.

Ahmad is a first-year student from Frederick, Maryland, and is interested in studying biology and Middle Eastern studies. He is active in the local Muslim community. Arabic is the first foreign language he has studied.

THE FLORENCE A. PASTORE MEMORIAL AWARD was established in 1994 by Col. Joseph A. Pastore (Ret.), former vice president for administration and finance and treasurer of Hood College, to honor the memory of his wife Florence. This prize is awarded to a student studying abroad in France or to an outstanding junior or senior majoring in French. Florence Pastore enjoyed her many connections to France and French culture. She died in 1989; Col. Pastore died in 1997. The award is presented to AJ Butwinick.

AJ is a graduating senior majoring in French, with an advanced proficiency certificate in Spanish. Her departmental honors project is a translation of a series of experiments on putrefaction conducted by French scientist Madame Thiroux in the late 18th century. AJ studied abroad in Toulouse, France, last year and is exploring options for graduate school.

THE DR. ROBERT KAUFMANN GERMAN PRIZE, established in 2011, is presented to a student who shows promise in the German language and has demonstrated a true passion for learning about German culture, history and politics. The recipient of this award is Zachary Cox.

Zachary is an honors student and a rising junior double majoring in psychology and English, with a concentration in creative writing. He is interested in studying abroad in Germany or Austria.

THE MARION MACPHAIL PRIZE is awarded to a senior major in Spanish who is not a native Spanish speaker and has not lived in a Spanish-speaking country for more than three months prior to entering Hood College. This award is given in recognition of proficiency in the Spanish language. Marion MacPhail, associate professor emerita of modern languages, taught French and Spanish at Hood from 1926 until 1966; she died in 1980. This year's recipient is Alexandra Kelly.

Alexandra is double majoring in Spanish and psychology. She is an honors student and was invited to complete the psychology departmental honors. She is part of the Hood College Jazz Ensemble and Wind Ensemble, where she plays the alto saxophone. She is also a choreographer for the Modeling Team. Alexandra studied abroad in Barcelona, and she previously worked as an au pair in Galicia for the summer. She is currently spreading her love for the Spanish language and culture with the SPAN 102 students in her role as assistant.

DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY

THE DR. LEONARD LATKOVSKI MEMORIAL PRIZE IN HISTORY was established in 2009 by the Department of History and renamed in 2015 in memory of Leonard Latkovski, Ph.D., professor of history. The award is presented to a junior or senior for outstanding achievement in history. This year's award goes to Suzanna Codd.

Suzanna recently completed an impressive, and rare, internship at the Maryland State Archives in Annapolis, Maryland, and looks to pursue a career in public history upon graduating from Hood.

THE JAMES B. RANCK BOOK PRIZE IN AMERICAN HISTORY is an annual gift honoring the late Professor Emeritus James B. Ranck. It provides prizes of significant books on American history or political life to a student who is outstanding in this field. Professor Ranck taught history and political science at Hood from 1929 to 1967; he died in 1988. The prize is awarded to Luke Jones.

Luke is a passionate scholar of history who, after graduation, hopes to build on his recent internship at Mt. Olivet Cemetery in Frederick, Maryland, where he worked on several research and restoration projects designed to increase public awareness of the local past.

THE ELIZABETH YOURTEE ANDERSON '82 HISTORY PRIZE was established in 2011 by the Anderson family in memory of Elizabeth Yourtee Anderson '82. The prize is presented annually to a student who has demonstrated outstanding achievement, integrity and passion for Maryland history, public history and/or historic preservation. The recipient is Stefanie Temple.

Stefanie recently returned from studying abroad in Ireland and, upon completing her degree in history at Hood, looks to pursue graduate work in archival studies and a career in public history.

THE KATHRYN E. HALE '04, M.S.'13 HISTORY TEACHING PRIZE was established in 2016 by Kathryn E. Hale '04, M.S.'13. The prize is awarded annually to one senior history major pursuing certification in secondary education who demonstrates excellence in the field of history and in teaching internships. Jazmin Colon is the recipient of this award.

Jazmin is an excellent student and, having completed her student teaching, is excited to begin a career helping students discover their own passion for history.

DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS

THE MARGARET ANN JONES HAYES '62 AWARD IN MATHEMATICS was established in 2023 by Ed Hayes in honor of his wife, Margaret Jones Hayes '62, who received her Bachelor of Arts in Mathematics from Hood and spent her career in the information technology industry, with extensive field development in Latin America, Asia and Canada. The award is given annually to an undergraduate student(s) studying mathematics who has shown unique problem-solving skills and clear communication with particularly effective use of the computer for computation, visualization and exploration. The award is shared by Don Ngo, Elizabeth Porter, Remi Schaber and Sam Turner.

Don is a junior from Frederick, Maryland, who is double majoring in mathematics and computer science. He is in the honors program and an active member of the Least Squares Mathematics Club. This summer, Don will leverage his expertise in mathematics, statistics and computer science to work on a research project at the Earth and Planets Laboratory of the Carnegie Institution for Science in Washington, D.C. After graduation, Don hopes to pursue a master's in artificial intelligence, which he hopes will lead to opportunities to work on projects that positively influence society and drive technological innovation.

Melissa has served on the leadership team of the Least Squares Mathematics Club for the past three years, encouraging Hood students to engage in mathematics as an extracurricular activity. In summer 2023, Melissa completed an internship at Northrup Grumman as a software engineer, working on a project involving software and hardware for radar, and has been invited back for another internship this summer. After graduation, Melissa plans to remain at Hood for an additional year to earn her master's in cybersecurity and then hopes to begin a career in data science, cybersecurity or software engineering.

Alex is a junior mathematics secondary education major from Puyallup, Washington. While at Hood, she was a Noyce Scholar in the Hood Noyce STEM Teacher Education Partnership, a scholarship program funded by the National Science Foundation. She is also a member of the Pi Mu Epsilon national mathematics honor society. Tori is currently teaching mathematics at Linganore High School and returned to Hood this spring to start her master's in mathematics education.

THE GRACE N. BROWN PRIZE IN MATHEMATICS, named in honor of the late Grace N. Brown, registrar emerita, is awarded to a student who has consistently shown initiative, insight and achievement in the introductory calculus course. Brown graduated from Hood in 1925, majoring in chemistry with a minor in mathematics. She served as Hood's registrar from 1930 to 1967. The prize recipient is Alex Esposito.

THE CATHERINE FILENE SHOUSE CAREER CENTER AND OFFICE OF SERVICE LEARNING DISTINGUISHED INTERN AWARD, established in 2014, is presented to a student who successfully completes an internship either for academic credit or experience. This student receives exceptional evaluations from intern supervisors and shows outstanding career attitude and professionalism. This year's recipients are Elijah Olsson and Dakota Pitts.

Eli is a senior majoring in computer science, with a minor in mathematics. In the spring semester, he interned at Leidos in Frederick, Maryland. Internship supervisor, Patrick Clune shared these thoughts about Eli's commitment to his team: "Eli has made excellent progress learning our technical domain. He collaborates well with his team leads, takes direction and is consistently able to make progress on assignments independently. The team has already carved off some challenging assignments that I would classify as a deep dive for an intern. Additionally, he's met or exceeded expectations on all assignments to date. He's the full package for a first-time hire, and I'm delighted he's joining full-time in June."

Dakota earned a Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration, with a concentration in human resource management, in January 2024. Before her graduation from Hood, she completed an internship with the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission in the Office of Small Business and Civil Rights. Internship supervisor Jeanne Dempsey said this about Dakota's dedication to her internship experience: "Dakota's performance, enthusiasm, positive attitude and active involvement in producing the video directly led to an improved product that has received commendation and accolades from agency deputy executive directors during a preview of the video assignment. In addition, Dakota participated in capability briefings with agency technical staff and company senior executives regarding multi-million-dollar contract opportunities and attended an outreach event hosted by the Small Business Administration that focused on expanding economic opportunities and access to capital for women-owned businesses. Dakota's performance during her tenure in the NRC's Office of Small Business and Civil Rights demonstrated readiness for the workforce, where she will undoubtedly thrive."

THE RONALD J. VOLPE SCHOLARS, established in 2014 by the Board of Trustees to honor Ronald J. Volpe, Hood's 10th president (2001 to 2015), is an endowed fund that supports a fellowship program with a focus on experiential learning, particularly through internship and research opportunities, both nationally and internationally. Isabella DiPietrantonio, Imaan Jaffer, Kingsly Mante Angua and Katelyn Svitak are the recipients of this award.

Isabella is a junior majoring in sustainability studies who will participate in the Costa Rica Summer Program through the InterVarsity Christian Fellowship. During this immersive six-week program, she will experience the diverse ecosystem of Costa Rica and study both sustainability and environmental justice from a Latin American perspective. She will live with a host family in an agricultural community, where she will learn about the area's history, environmental concerns, economic and political issues, and cultural dynamics. She will learn directly from local professors, practitioners, non-governmental organization leaders and public service professionals.

Imaan is a junior double majoring in global studies and computer science, with a minor in mathematics. An international student from Tanzania, her area of focus is global security. Imaan is using her Volpe Scholar Award to participate in an internship through the Washington Internship Institute, where she is studying international politics and interning at the Vikāra Institute, a nonprofit organization dedicated to accelerating development in support of resilient and growing systems. Vikāra supports the positive development of international systems that impact markets, livelihoods, health, education, women, youth and the environment.

Kingsly is a junior majoring in public health, with a minor in global studies. Kingsly's Volpe Scholar Award will fund an internship experience at the National Academies of Science, Engineering and Medicine under the Genomics Roundtable in Washington, D.C. The Genomics Roundtable has core themes of innovation, dialogue, equity and adoption. These experiences will uniquely support Kingsly's desire to understand the underlying reasons behind persistent global health-related issues, such as access to clean water, lack of prenatal care, malaria and inadequate funding for research, with a particular interest in problems affecting African nations.

Katelyn is a junior majoring in psychology who is furthering her undergraduate degree in the 4PLUS program, allowing her to also complete a master's in mental health counseling. Katelyn will use her Volpe Scholar Award to study abroad at Vrije Universiteit in Amsterdam. Katelyn's goal is to research alternative mental health therapies for global communities, specifically in support of vulnerable and underserved populations. While in Amsterdam, she will be able to study with leading academics in these areas, visit lab facilities for those with intellectual and physical disabilities, and gain firsthand knowledge of psychology and therapeutic interventions through a cross-cultural lens.

DIVISION OF COMMUNITY AND INCLUSIVITY

THE MARY ANN KERINS HUMANITARIAN AWARD, established in 2009, is presented to a student who best personifies the characteristics and contributions of Mary Ann Kerins, director and staff counselor of the Hood College Counseling Center until her death in December 2008. Kerins was known for her passion and commitment to helping students and others on their path to wellness. Her quiet and gentle leadership, coupled with her advocacy for human rights, equality and democracy for all individuals, has left a positive impact on the Hood College community. Compassion, empathy, fairness, honesty and respect for oneself and others are among the many positive qualities that she possessed. This award is presented to Travis Moulton.

Travis is a member of the Class of 2026 and a nursing student from Braddock Heights, Maryland. He is a member of the U.S. Army Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) program and president of Rotaract. Travis was also a facilitator for new student conversations (Pillar Talks). He received multiple nominations for this award, with his nominators consistently referencing his kindness, sense of duty and deep commitment to service to others—qualities very much in common with Mary Ann Kerins.

THE DR. CHRISTINE MCHENRY CORDE, MENTE ET MANU AWARD, established in honor of Dr. Christine McHenry, Class of 1973, honors a student who embodies the spirit of Hood's motto, uniting "heart, mind and hand." The recipient of this award has demonstrated understanding of a local or global need, a heart for service and a willingness to volunteer in efforts that further the cause of justice and peace. This year's recipient is Allia Farzand.
